

GRESHAM, Ore. — A 5-year-old Gresham boy died Wednesday after he was mauled by a pit bull terrier that was secured to a 13-foot chain in a fenced back vard.

Christopher Dickey, son of Pam and Dave Dickey of Gresham, was dead at the scene.

5-year-old killed by pit buil terrier

GRESHAM — A 5-year-old Gresham boy died Wednesday after he was mauled by a pit bull terrier that was secured to a 13-foot chain in a fenced back yard, authorities said. Christopher Dickey, son of Pam and Dave Dickey of Gresham, was dead at the scene, according to the Multnomah County medical examiner's office. Multnomah County sheriff's deputies said the child apparently wandered away from a nearby home his mother was cleaning and got into the back yard where the dog was chained. The boy was found about 6 p.m. by a man deputies identified as Lester Maynard, who had gone to the back yard of the house where the 4-year-old terrier was kept to feed it. Deputies said the dog was owned by Maynard's son, who was not identified.

Pit bull that killed boy is destroyed

TROUTDALE — A pit bull dog that killed a 5-year-old Gresham boy was put to death Thursday afternoon, Multnomah County officials said. Phil Clifford, spokesman for Multnomah County animal control, said both the owner of the dog, Lance Maynard, and his father, Lester Maynard, had signed papers to have the 4-year-old dog destroyed. The dog, named Schlitz II, was held in a cage at the animal shelter before being put to death by injection, Clifford said. On Wednesday the dog mauled and killed Christopher Dickey, son of David and Pam Dickey of Gresham. The animal was at the end of a 13-foot chain that had been fastened to a fence post in the back yard of the elder Maynard's home.
