Elderly man found dead in pre-dawn dog attack

An 81-year-old south Gwinnett County man who was **killed** Thursday **by** his next-door neighbor's part **pit bull** terrier apparently wandered over before dawn to see the chained animal, investigators said. James C. Mills, who lived in a mobile home at 2835 N. Deshon Road near Stone Mountain, was found **by** the dog's owner at about 7:15 a.m., Gwinnett police spokesman Larry Walton said.

Mr. Mills died from multiple trauma to the head and neck, according to the Gwinnett medical examiner's office.

"I think this was an accident, pure and simple," said Hal Bennett, a Gwinnett medical investigator. "I played with the dog a little while afterwards even. I'm told that this man was a bit of an insomniac who kind of liked to get outside sometimes.

"He walked into the dog's domain, and I'm sure he just surprised the dog," said Mr. Bennett. "The dog had no history of being vicious and was probably asleep when he came over to the yard. He had been around those dogs many times before."

He said he thought Mr. Mills fell - and died - almost instantly, adding that the dog apparently knocked Mr. Mills down.

"The dog weighed 75 pounds," Mr. Bennett said, "and the man weighed only about 135."

The dog involved in the attack was taken to the Gwinnett Animal Shelter. Authorities have made no decision on whether to destroy the animal, named Bandit, said Steven S. Schildecker, Gwinnett's public safety director.

However, one of Mr. Mills's sons said the animal should die

"I just want the dog killed," said Bryant Mills. "It's killed a man, and it's vicious, I think."

Carlton Wright, who owns Bandit and another dog, told police he heard barking about 5:30 a.m., said Officer Walton. When Mr. Wright went out to feed his dogs less than two hours later, he found Mr. Mills's body in the yard with the dog beside him, a family member said.

Officer Walton said the dogs had been properly secured and had up-to-date inoculations. He said police had no plans to charge Mr. Wright in the incident.

Mr. Mills's granddaughter, Robin Whitesides, said she couldn't understand why her grandfather was next door long before sunrise.

"We don't know why he was up at that hour, why he went over there. He's the only one who will ever know that," Ms. Whitesides said. "He was in real good health. If this hadn't happened, he probably would have lived to be 100."

Cheryl Mills, the victim's daughter-in-law, said the Wrights called her family "as soon as they found him. They didn't want to touch him, but they just thought he was hurt at first."

At the Wrights' trailer 30 yards away, the family declined to comment. An old, blind yellow dog said to be Bandit's sister, was chained to a tree, barking ho arsely in the side yard.

Mr. Wright, who has owned the two animals for almost 10 years, kept them chained next to his home, Officer Walton said.

Another of Mr. Mills's son, Charles Mills, had recently had a stroke and was taking the news very hard, family members said.

"He was a good man," said Charles Mills, walking with a cane as his family helped him into a truck. "A very good man."

Ms. Whitesides said the elder Mr. Mills had moved to the Stone Mountain area long ago from Sylva, N.C. and started a business that specialized in tree-cutting, stump removal and firewood. The side yard of his trailer was full of trucks and power equipment used in the business, which Mr. Mills had taught to his sons.


